









## WHY OPEN ACCESS?









#### ZED BOOKS

- Founded in 1977
- Leading source of critical, de-colonial, and anticolonial approaches to social sciences research
- African Studies, International Development, Development Economics, Gender Studies
- Foregrounds and promotes research on and from the Global South



## BLOOMSBURY OPEN COLLECTIONS

- Collective-action / subscribe-to-open-type
   OA model for scholarly books
- No author fees, OA on publication
- Pilot: 20 frontlist titles in African Studies and International Development
- Private benefits for participating libraries:
  - Guaranteed permanent access to all 20 titles in the collection
  - One year's access to 194 related backlist titles.








### PILOT OUTCOMES

50% of funding target achieved = 10 books publishing OA at no cost to the author


- Of 58 authors, 17 are based in the Global South
- Edited collections are primarily Global North-Global South collaborations
- Authors and contributors based in Cape Verde, DRC, Ghana, Maasailand and South Africa




















# WHAT DID WE LEARN? AUTHORS




# WHAT DID WE LEARN? BLOOMSBURY

- Uncertainty about whether books would publish OA was challenging
- Offering multiple models adds cost and complexity
- Requires transformation people, culture, systems





#### AFTER THE PILOT: YEAR 2



- Model essentially the same as the pilot.
- New Open Collections are interdisciplinary.
- Prioritising authors from Global South / ECRs / underrepresented.
- Each Open Collection operates independently.

# SCALING UP DIAMOND OA FOR BOOKS

- Are collective-action/diamond OA models all competing with each other for dedicated OA funds?
- What will it take to move budget from purchase to OA models?
- Need to recognise the importance of arts, humanities, and social sciences and recognise that in funding and budgets.
