- Only 5% of the MEP are members of a *non-European minority*

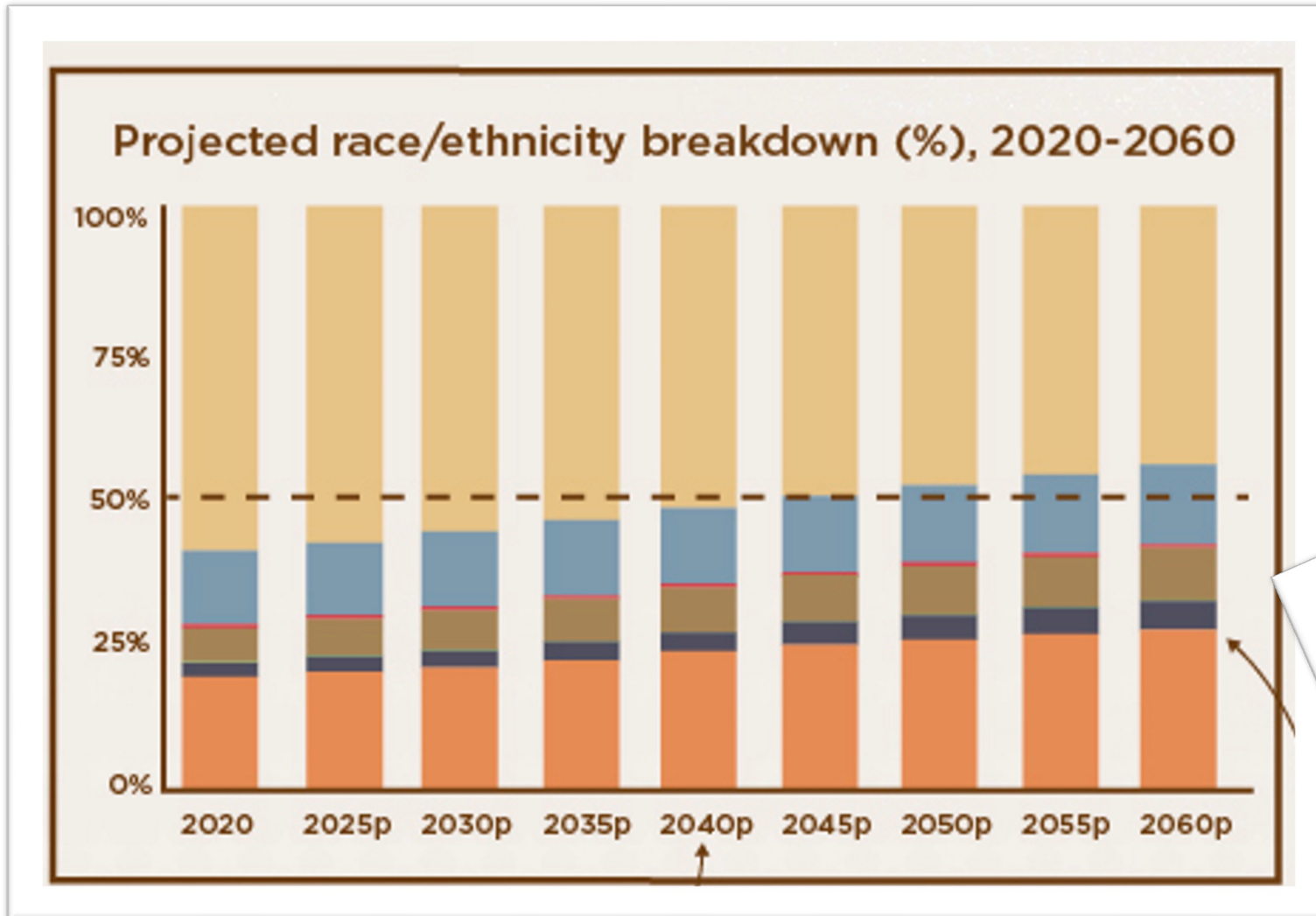

Collection Development

- “Collection development is enhanced by individual purchase requests from EUI scholars and project teams for books, journals, databases, news resources and reference works – in both the traditional EUI departmental profiles, and in specialised and **emerging topics** which are essential for doctoral, post-doctoral and inter-disciplinary research in history, law and the social sciences. It is no longer possible to categorise any information requirements as ‘non-core’, and the Library fulfills the overwhelming majority of individual and project-related requests.”
- “**Suggestions from scholars** help enrich the collections by informing librarians of **emergent themes**, new works, new editions”

Collection Development

- “The needs of the disciplinary areas of the EUI **in relation to national and linguistic requirements** vary significantly by discipline, topic and research methodology. For example, history and law have much greater needs in this regard. Publication types considered important for country coverage include: (i) national histories (ii) journals focusing on national topics, discourse and culture, or on groups of countries with a common language (iii) bibliographies, dictionaries, encyclopedias and other reference works (iv) national newspaper archives (v) official and institutional publications (vi) law reports, now included in legal databases and (vii) series of foreign policy documents.”
- “The nature of the EUI compels it to assume **a multilingual approach** as one of the principles of collection development – even if limits of a practical nature restrict its application. Research outputs in some disciplines, such as economics, political science and sociology, are **overwhelmingly** in English”

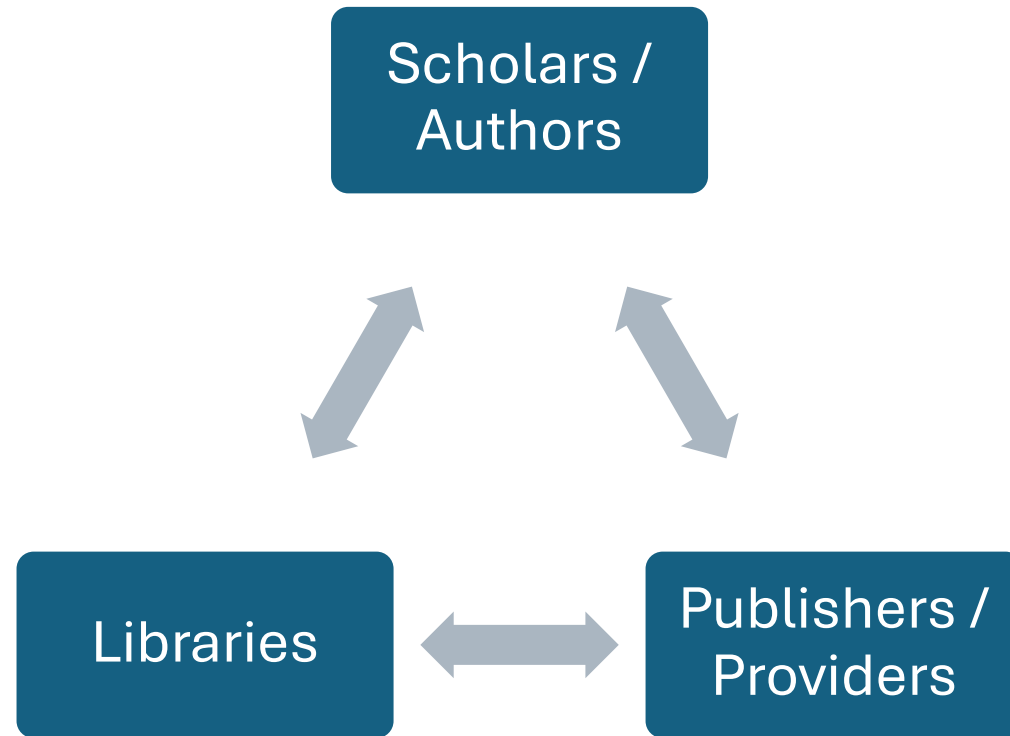
